Formerly a professor with the University of South Florida, Dr. Glen Dunlap is internationally recognized for his contributions to science in the areas of applied behavior analysis, positive behavior support, early intervention, developmental disabilities and family support.

Dr. Dunlap's legacy at the University of South Florida includes establishing the first Center for Autism and Related Disabilities and providing leadership in the development of numerous research, training, and technical assistance projects related to the implementation of Positive Behavior Support, early intervention, evidencebased practice, and improving runaway behavior. He collaborated on the design and implementation of the Applied Behavior Analysis program, and secured over 100 million dollars in external funding for applied research, training, and technical assistance.

He has authored more than 230 articles and book chapters, authored and edited seven books, and served on 15 editorial boards. Dr. Dunlap was the founding editor of the *Journal of Positive Behavior Interventions* and is the current editor of *Topics in Early Childhood Special Education*.
