Teen mothers are far more likely to drop out of school than other female youth. Teen mothers often resort to leaving school and/or their job in order to take care of children, which in turn puts teen moms at particularly high risk for unemployment and poverty.




DID YOU KNOW?

Approximately 1 out of every 5 incarcerated youth in Mississippi's juvenile justice system suffers from a serious mental health disorder.


Juvenile Justice Dispositions by Male Youth:
