## Parent Resource Center

#### \*What is it?\*

An informal setting for parents, designed to be accessible and comfortable.

#### \*Where is it?\*

Usually in a local school, but can be in other public places (rec. center, mall).



#### \*What happens there?\*

Meetings between parents and school staff, parents talking with other parents, parent groups and workshops.

#### \*What does it contain?\*

Information about current school programs and events.

Reading materials to help parents assist their children in learning.



Games, books, and videos that parents can use with children at home,

Exchange boxes to share books, toys, and household items.



Information and guidance about

higher education opportunities, cultural and community services and agencies to help families with educational, health, and social service needs. Information and materials to help develop parenting skills.

# \*What are the topics of resource materials?\*

#### Family life

Changing in family (divorce, death, etc)

Parenting and child care (discipline, etc)

Home management (financial planning, etc)

Survival skills (nutrition, job service, etc)

Health and well being (fitness, stress management)

Crisis referrals (physical abuse assistance, substance abuse programs, etc)

## \*Where can I find one?\*

Ask your local school. If they don't have one, ask them for the nearest school that does have one.

Encourage your school to create a parent resource center through your parent-teacher organization.
