Why my child?
The reasons for these difficult goodbyes at the preschool door are as varied as the personalities of the children who experience them. Here are some possibilities:

A new environment, new faces, and new adults can be frightening.

Difficulty being in a large group where children must share.

Overwhelmed by noise and activity level of a classroom.

Changes in your child's life or returning after vacation or illness can be stressful.

A parent has been away.

A negative experience at school.

Routines to the rescue...

Children thrive on the predictability of rituals and routines. Create a drop-off routine along with your child's teacher. Select a series of steps that you will take every day.

Drop-off routine ideas

Create a special goodbye rhyme, song, or handshake.

Leave an "I love you" note that the teacher can read after you leave.

Start a "Goodbye Book" and work on a page together each morning before you say goodbye.

Make a calendar or chart and mark each successful goodbye with a special sticker.

Leave a family photo in your child's cubby. Talk to your child about what you'll do to say goodbye before your arrive.
